# Spiral & Whorl Hunt

**Concept:** Spirals & whorls in nature (shells, flowers, fingerprints, storms)

#### Materials:

- Printed "Spiral & Whorl Hunt" checklist
- Pencils or crayons
- Optional: phone/tablet for photos

### Steps:

- 1. As a family, quickly review what a spiral/whorl is (shells, sunflower centers, fingerprints, storms).
- 2. Give each child a checklist with simple items: "Something with a spiral," "Something that curls," (we have included one here as well)
- 3. Go for a walk indoors or outdoors (yard, park, neighborhood) and search for spirals and whorls in real life.
- 4. Each time someone finds one, pause and:
- 5. Circle or check it off on the sheet.
- 6. Either draw a quick sketch or take a photo.
- 7. After 15–30 minutes, go back home and spread out the drawings/photos.
- 8. As a group, talk through: Where did we see spirals? Were they in living things? Weather? Objects people made?
- 9. End by having kids choose their favorite spiral/whorl and write one sentence: "I found this pattern in \_\_\_\_\_."

## Look for spirals in...

- A snail shell
- A sunflower center (seed spiral)
  - A pinecone
  - A swirling staircase
    - A twirling vine
  - A rolled-up fern leaf
  - A twisted rope or coiled hose
    - A fingerprint pattern
- A swirling cloud or storm photo
  - A spiral notebook binding

## Look for whorls in...

- Tree rings (circles & whorls)
- The center of a rose or daisy
- Water swirling down a drain
- The pattern on a seashell
- Bark patterns on certain trees
  - A whorl in someone's hair
- The inside of sliced fruits (kiwi, apple core, cabbage)
  - Mini whirlpools in streams or puddles
    - Sand or wind patterns that curve
      - A coiled ribbon or yarn bundle
